Principal's Message

ESAs are a concern for all. There are so many unknown answers to all of our questions. To make matters even more complicated, tuition rates for K-12 have not yet been finalized for 2023-24 as we are still waiting for state guidance regarding Educational Savings Accounts. One of the most often asked questions in relation to ESAs is if tuition will be raised to the \$7,600 amount available in an ESA. The answer is no. You can expect more modest tuition increases. We have been told that the realistic increase will be similar to each previous year, between 3 - 5%. Again, no numbers have been finalized yet. As soon as we get the numbers from SCCS, they will be forwarded to all families.

Conferences are upon us next week. I am so sorry that we had the wrong month listed for the Sign-Up Genius. This has been corrected.

Unpredictable weather is once again a topic at school. With this quickly changing weather pattern, we wanted to send out a reminder to check the weather for the day and help your children with the appropriate clothing.

A friendly reminder about parking lot safety at dismissal...

ALL cars should turn right when exiting their parking spot and form a single file line to exit on the last row of the parking lot.

Educational Savings Accounts (ESAs)

The "Student First Act" passed the legislature and was signed into law by Governor Reynolds. The following is a general summary of the bill:

Education Savings Accounts

Parents who choose to enroll their children in an accredited private school will receive the amount of per pupil funds allocated annually by the state to use for tuition, fees, and other qualified expenses. Funds are deposited into an education savings account (ESA) each year until students graduate or complete high school or turn 20 years of age. Educational Savings Accounts will be phased in over three years.

Effective for the 2023-24 school year, state per pupil funding will be \$7,598 per student, and ESAs will be available based on the following eligibility:

Year 1: School Year 2023-24

- All kindergarten students
- All students who were not in a non-public school the year prior
- Private school students with a household income at or below 300% Federal Poverty Level (FPL), currently at about about \$83,250 for a family of four but subject to change

Year 2: School Year 2024-25

- All kindergarten students (and first graders)
- All students who were not in a non-public school the year prior
- Private school students with a household income at or below 400% FPL, currently about \$111,000 for a family of four but subject to change

Year 3: School Year 2025-26

All K-12 students in lowa regardless of income

Other student funding generated by categorical funding formulas will remain with public school districts even for students who are not attending public schools any more. This amount is about \$1,202 per pupil for each student who will be attending a private school.

Next steps include the writing of the Administrative Rules at the state level and the development of processes to then be used in Scott County Catholic Schools. As you can imagine, there is a lot of work being done rapidly as enrollment processes for 2023-24 are set to begin sometime in February. More information will be made available when we have it.
